We have just entered the liturgical season of Pentecost. Called by many the birthday of the church, Pentecost represents a passing of the mantle of sorts—from the Incarnate Christ to the ever-present Spirit, the reminder of the God within, the sustainer, the teacher, the strengthener. Pentecost is a day of celebration for all that God has done and is doing within the life of the church.

The **Primary Themes** of this season in the Church are: Unity in Diversity, Holy Spirit, Extravagant Praise, Gifts of the Spirit, and Hospitality. Our Worship Services and our Outreach programs this late spring and into summer will retain a focus on these Pentecost themes. With Covid 19 still in our midst, human rights issues at the forefront, and the continued demands of self isolation we need to dwell upon these primary themes and God's Word.

"God's Word does not fall to the ground without bearing fruit. How does the church, how do we, react to the saving grace of God we have observed in the drama of the seasons from Advent through Easter? The disciples wondered about this as well. They huddled together, wondering, in the upper room until the Day of Pentecost (literally, 50 days). That was the day the Holy Spirit of **God** came upon them and they became great warriors of the faith! Pentecost is the great day of realization that God has given us life and power to be different. The season called the Season after **Pentecost** is that time in the church year when we react to the story of salvation proclaimed in the preceding cycle of seasons. The colour used is green, symbolizing growth – growth of the grass and trees, growth of crops, growth of the church, growth of Christians together in the fellowship of faith. - https://www.stjames-manotick.org/church-year/

Father Paul Walmsley

If you were to walk into 190 Queen's Avenue, London our Huron diocesan office, (not now, they're not open), there on the wall is this striking, intriguing piece of devotional image art, entitled "The Hospitality of Abraham" and it is also known by "The Trinity." The icon was created by a Russian iconographer, Andrei Rublev, in the 15th century. It is still on display in Moscow.



Rublev's three primary colors illustrate facets of the Holy One all contained in Three. Rublev considered gold the color of the Father – perfection, fullness, wholeness, the ultimate source.

He considered blue the color of the human – both sea and sky mirroring one another – and therefore God in Christ taking on the world, taking on humanity. Rublev pictures Christ as blue, displaying his two fingers to tell us that he has put spirit and matter, divinity and humanity, together within himself - and for us!

And then there is green, easily representative of the spirit. Hildegard of Bingen, the German Benedictine Abbess, a musical composer, writer, philosopher, mystic and overall visionary, living three centuries before Rublev called the spirit's endless fertility and fecundity "veridatis," a quality of divine aliveness that makes everything blossom and bloom in endless shades of green. As you can see this beautifully points to

our summer, our liturgical green. Rublev, in similar reverence for the natural world, chose green to represent, as it were, the photosynthesis that divine grows everything from within by transforming light into itself – precisely the work of the Holy Spirit. I urge you to download this icon from the internet. I know, I have it framed in our house because this is one that yields more fruit the more you gaze on it. It beckons you. Every part of it was meditated upon with great care: the gaze between the Three; the deep respect between the Three as they all share from a common bowl. And note the hand of the Spirit pointing toward the open and fourth place at the table! Is the Holy Spirit inviting, offering and clearing space? If so, for what? Now this is the part that grabs me, that I find intriguing. As magnificent as this icon – and this fellowship - is ... there is something missina.

They're circling a shared table, and if you look on the front of the table there appears to be a little rectangular *hole* painted there. Most people just pass right over it, but art historians say that the remaining glue on the original icon indicates that there was perhaps once a *mirror* glued to the front of the table. Well, this is a pretty unusual feature for an icon. One would normally not put a real mirror on the front of a holy icon. And this is the point. It's stunning when you think about it – there was room at the table for a fourth. The Observer.

Outreach Update

At the heart of Christian revelation, God is not seen as a distant, static monarch – a *divine circle dance* as the early fathers of the church dared to call it. God is the Holy One presence in the dynamic and loving action of Three. But even this Three fullness does not like to eat alone. So, the invitation is to share at this divine table is probably the first biblical hint of what we would eventually call "salvation."

On Trinity Sunday we have a reading from the Book of Genesis all about Creation, and later in Genesis, Genesis 18:1-8, we have a space at God's table. We have the Lord appearing to Abraham and I urge you to look at this particular passage as it's the inspiration for this art group and points to The Trinity.

We face this summer with so many questions as we have worked through a spring one will never forget. I want you, over the next few months, to take this image into yourself. Recognize that this table is not reserved exclusively for The Three, nor is this *divine circle dance* a closed circle; we are all invited in. All creation is invited in, and this is the liberation God intended from the very beginning. This divine intention – this audacious invitation – is embedded in Creation itself; it later becomes concrete, personal, and touchable in Jesus.

Our final goal of union with God is grounded in creation itself, and also in our own unique creation. Our starting place was always *original goodness*. This makes our ending place – and everything in between – possessing an inherent capacity for goodness, truth and beauty.

Salvation is not some occasional, later emergency additive but God's ultimate intention from the very beginning, even "written in our hearts."

Are you ready to take your place at this wondrous table? Can you imagine that you are already a part of the dance?

We go forward in this summer of Pentecost in the year 2020 embracing the Holy Spirit to participating in this dance of life. + Father Paul

"I Can't Breathe"

What was usually called the Second Commandment was often translated as "Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain."

We were told that meant we should not cuss or curse people.

As we know from scripture Jewish people teach that any speaking of the divine name was in vain.

Any attempt to capture the Divine Essence in an spoken word was futile; this is the best way to interpret the name given to Moses – "I Am Who I Am" and its original Hebrew form YHWH (the letters yod, he, vay, he) which we translate as **Yahweh**.

But this is where I have been so moved. It's also unspeakable because it was meant to imitate and replicate the sound of human breathing in and out. Try it now!

First, inhale. (Say 'Yah' breathing inward – don't use your tongue on your lips). And then exhale (Say 'weh' breathing outward, just let the breath glide out over your tongue.

You can breathe God. In fact, this means the very first word you ever spoke when you came out of your mother's body was the sacred Name, and it will be the last.

"I can't breathe, Momma".

George Floyd had a last breath.

We pray for him and stand in solidarity with all those respecting life and the freedom to worship.

Whenever you feel the need for greater awareness, the presence in your life, stop and hear this Name in your breathing.

St. James' Worship Team under Father Paul's initiative decided to go to a format of taping our Sunday services and circulating the information to our parish members and friends of St. James'





Access to the taped Morning Prayer services can be accessed through YouTube. After our Thursday morning tapings, the videos are uploaded by our technician, Martin Jackson, to the internet and are posted as three sessions. This decision was made to allow for ease of uploading the tapings and it also allows our parishioners a choice - to view all three parts one right after another, or break their viewing session up. An email is then sent out every Saturday to our membership list with the access info for the YouTube URLs. This allows people to to click on for them for easy access for viewing on Sunday. As well, the service video information is posted to our church web site <u>www.stjamesingersoll.com</u> and to St.James' Anglican Church Ingersoll Facebook page. If you are not on our email send out list and would like to be, please contact Veronica at <u>veronicastjames@gmail.com</u>

For those parishioners who cannot access the internet, we offer the service of taping the audio of the service and delivering it to their homes. With the tape, a copy of the "Order of Service" is included. Kristy Van Kooten Bossence not only provides the wonderful music for our services, but looks after preparing the final service bulletin. It is attached to our email messages.

The Worship Team members each look after a particular part of the service – Father Paul performs his normal priestly duties – greeting, homily, benediction, etc.; Lay Reader Bob Welt delivers the Gospel reading and leads additional prayers; Lay Reader Sharon Gillett or Warden Michael Watson leads us in the reading of the Psalm, and Prayers of the People; Music Director Kristy reads the Second Reading and ties all parts together with music; and, Warden Veronica Jackson reads the First Reading and looks after the camera work (the iPad taping).

We would love to be able to add additional personnel to our team but with the present restrictions put in place by the provincial government (limiting our numbers to five), we will have to wait awhile before we can do that. Social distancing is also a necessity. We are very appreciative of all the cards, letters, phone calls and emails that we have received from our "followers"! Thank you! It is a privilege to assist Father Paul and strive to bring some familiarity to our parishioners as we participate in our homes in St. James' Sunday services of worship.

"I remember not so very long ago when hugs were not a big part of my life. Days when I wished more than anything to have someone to just hold methat's all, just to feel loving arms around me. I don't come from a family of huggers, in fact, more often than not when I was a child, many members of my family avoided touching at all if they didn't have to. I didn't really know what I was missing until I got my first job and taught in a school full of 'touchers.' These people couldn't have a conversation without touching you on the arm or the shoulder to emphasize a point. Although it felt uncomfortable at first, I soon became a 'toucher' too. I think human contact is a need that is built into us from birth.

The best touch of all, and the one that so many people are searching for without realizing it, is the touch of God in our lives. We have this big empty space in our innermost self that can only be filled by Him. When we try to fill it with stuff, or money, or people or drink/drugs as so many do, that hole seems to get bigger rather than smaller. It is never filled except by Him. Think about what helps you feel at peace and to have hope: Being near nature, sitting in the sunshine, feeling fresh air, taking time to "be in the moment." Try deep, slow breathing, meditation, relaxation, prayer, or keeping a gratitude journal.
