Preparation for Christ's Coming

Perhaps you've heard the story of the little boy who desperately wanted a bike for Christmas. His parents could not afford a bike, so he decided to write a letter to God asking for a bike. He started out by writing: "Dear God, I've been a really good boy this year." Unfortunately, he remembered that God was all knowing and all seeing and he decided that he shouldn't lie to God. So, he crumpled up that letter and started over. This time he wrote: "Dear God, I know I haven't done everything I should have, but I really tried to be good." He stopped and crumpled up that letter, too. It was obvious that he was struggling with what to write to God.

As he sat there thinking he looked up and saw his mother's favorite piece of sculpture on the mantel. It was a beautiful rendition of the Crèche, baby Jesus in the manger with Mary and Joseph kneeling beside him. The boy perked up and ran out of the room. He came back with a towel and a shoe box. He walked over, carefully picked up the baby Jesus, gently wrapped it in the towel, carefully put it in the shoe box and then hid it in the closet. He immediately went back to the table and wrote: "Dear God, if you ever want to see your Son again . . ."

Every year the world, with its multiplicity of gadgets and this year's list of must have toys, tries to make demands and hold Christmas for ransom, but it never works. The birth of the Christ child is just too powerful, even for Bay Street. The sight and the sounds and the remembrance of this child born so long ago changes all the rules. His very presence makes the glitter of our Christmas presents pale in comparison.

Ours is a God who has created all things and pronounced them "Good". Ours is the God who says to each of us "Come to me all you who are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." Ours is the God of St. Paul, who has giving to each one of us His peace, a peace that passes any kind of human understanding. Ours is the God who has taken on flesh in the Person of Jesus, and has lived with us, and died for us. And in the resurrection, ours is the God who is present to us, and in love with us. God with us and for us. This is a God in love with us, and calling us to fall deeper and deeper in love with him.

And that's the God we meet this Christmas morning.

God with us and God for us. Once we clearly recognize that Truth, then we can properly prepare for the coming of Christmas by reflecting on the grace and the power of what has been done for us by God. We need to prepare for the coming of Christmas by opening our hearts to the wonder of God become human for us in the person of the child of Bethlehem. And we need to do that through prayer.

Before the celebration, take time alone with God and consider what it is we celebrate, and give thanks for the Real meaning of Christmas. Don't wind up in a position of simply acknowledging an event, become part of the event. And you can only do that through prayerful preparation to meet God in Jesus Christ. And then this Christmas we can rejoice with great hope and great confidence in proclaiming "for to us is born this day, in the city of David, a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord!



A full house witnessed Bishop Todd bless our new building marking the official launch of a new era of worship services and activities for St. James'. The worship service was followed by a social time when we all had an opportunity to chat and share in the excitement.

That day was made possible by every one of us in this parish remaining committed to crossing the finish line together.

All building committee members as well as The Vision Implementation Committee (VIC), both past and present members, worked tirelessly over the past six years on this project and each of them appreciates your support in helping us fulfill our mandate to resettle the parish. I offer my sincere thanks to each of them for their thoughtfulness, time commitment, collaboration and faithfulness.

Having achieved our mandate, the Vision Implementation Committee has been officially dissolved.

While we enjoy our new surroundings and get our "land legs" as they say, there is still much to do. In November, we reapplied to the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) and provided all the various support documents they require to consider our request for tax exemption. Stay tuned!

Recently, our front windows were frosted, now providing a comfortable degree of privacy and soon the front façade will be adorned with our name. The Spring / Summer interval will see the front masonry repaired / renewed and our roof repaired.

Currently, our coffee room is in need of counters and cupboards. A quote for that work has been received and will be considered by the design committee over the next few weeks. Once approved by all levels, we'll need to source the necessary funds.

SENTENCE OF CONSECRATION

DEARLY BELOVED IN THE LORD,

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, Amen.

WHEREAS a Church has been erected in the Town of Ingersoll, within our Diocese and jurisdiction;

AND WHEREAS the said building is complete and furnished with all things requisite for the due performance of public worship; and, is now ready for CONSECRATION;

AND WHEREAS, a Petition has been presented to us by the Incumbent and others, praying that we would be pleased to CONSECRATE the said building.

NOW THEREFORE, WE Todd, by divine permission and in Apostolic Succession, Bishop of Huron, do by virtue of the authority Ordinary and Episcopal to us committed, CONSECRATE the said building, and do set it apart from all profane and common uses, and do dedicate the same to Almighty God for the ministration of His Holy Word and Sacraments, and for public worship, according to the rites and ceremonies of the Anglican Church of Canada, by the name of: SAINT JAMES CHURCH, in the Town of INGERSOLL.

WE DO PRONOUNCE, DECREE AND DECLARE THAT the said Church shall remain so CONSECRATED, set apart and dedicated forever.

IN the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Amen.

Now Welcoming the Advent Season: The Angel Tree Campaign


