

Treasure Box Poetry And Praise

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

From The Desk of The Reverend Marty Keatings

Rev'd Marty's Thanksgiving letter has been published here for those of our readers who did not receive one by email, delivery or mail.



Give Thanks unto the ORD; Psalm 106:1 for He is good.

As summer turns to autumn, the celebration of the Harvest is an opportunity for us to come together in thanksgiving for the bounty of God's creation. At this time our Church takes on a festive air as it is filled with beautiful flowers, fruits and vegetables that remind us of our agricultural roots and our reliance on God's abundance.

It gives us opportunity to rejoice in good times and plentiful harvests, but it means more than that. This time of year not only signals the end of the harvest, but also signals the end of another church year. Over the next few weeks as our church year comes to an end, I invite you to pay particular attention to the Gospel readings. In them, Christ challenges us to examine our priorities. Christ calls us to put first things first. And our first priority is to be the kingdom of God.

For most people in our society God does not even make the list. We worry about our children, our families, our pets, our bills, our retirement, our taxes. Our primary concern in life must not be just what sustains us in life, job, income, pension, food, clothes, reputation, status. Our security is to come from our relationship with God.

All of us can recall I am sure, as children, getting ready to go to a birthday party. Dressed up in our best party clothes, a carefully wrapped gift in hand, Mom would give us a peck on the cheek and the admonition "Remember to say thank you." It was always, and still remains good advice. Yet it seems that as part of one of the wealthiest countries in the world we often take the good things that come our way for granted.

The people of Israel kept holy days to honour God for His gracious care. We have turned them into holidays, not to God, but to our own indulgence and gratification. The people of Israel had times of Jubilee; specific times set aside to give special thanks to God for His grace, love, and mercy. We could certainly learn from their example.

You see, we are all a part of His harvest, fruit of His commitment and sacrifice. Above all, thanksgiving means giving of ourselves. It means committing ourselves, body, mind and spirit, to God. Vision Committee News



In the June 2024 edition of the Loop we talked about several issues being addressed that were identified as concerns as a result of our building permit application to the Town of Ingersoll. All items were resolved quickly except for an easement the Town of Ingersoll wanted established for mutual access by us and our neighbours to / from our second floor hallway.

We have left no stone unturned in our attempts to obtain a permit while lawyers worked on the easement process. Unfortunately, the Town of Ingersoll decided to withhold our permit until easements are actually registered on our property title, and that of our neighbours. Regrettably, a valuable and productive summer construction interval has been lost while we wait for the easement issue to play out.

At the time of this writing, we are encouraged that the survey has been completed and delivered to legal counsels as of September 24th. Once the lawyers register the easements to the property titles, we expect the Town of Ingersoll to issue our permit expeditiously.

While this process takes place, our contractor will seek revised bids from various trades since it has been more than three months since receipt of our most recent budget numbers.



I'm sure most of you know the drill! I will pick up and deliver, or shop for, any donations. As I write this note mid-September, the Food Bank is anticipating running out of food in November. St. James' was asked to relay this information to our community churches and ask for food drives during the month of October. Reverend Marty sent this request to the Ministerial Group. The response was "yes" for October Food Drives!

St. James' participation will be in the form of "Cereal Sundays". Cereal will be accepted, in the little red wagon, on October 13th – Thanksgiving Sunday. September 29th and October 6th were also "Cereal Sundays". Thank you to those who have already donated or plan to do so.

Jeannie and I have been spending more time at the Food Bank than intended......but, we love it! It has been a humbling experience for both of us. We hear stories that, unfortunately, highlight the shortcomings of our healthcare system and lack of affordable housing. Most of us read about landlords evicting for higher rents; we hear the stories and see the victims.

There are a few positive stories. They involve persons who have finally been accepted for ODSP (Ontario Disability Support Program) or someone who has been able to find gainful employment. These are huge successes! We also serve as best we can, those who are without a home.

Thank you to our local businesses. They help as they are able. Most recently Cargill gifted the food bank with 24, 4# boxes of chicken breasts. That was in August. We will make those last until October. Giant Tiger allowed us to make a large purchase of Chunky Soups at their sale price. At this time the foodbank is in need of: tins of: meats (ham, chicken, tuna etc.), vegetables, alphaghetti/ravioli, brown beans, cream soups (chicken, mushroom etc), and boxes of instant potatoes, cereal, and sliced white bread.

Important Eucharist News

Eucharistic Practice and the Risk of Infection

Below are exerts from the Diocesan **'Eucharistic Practice and the Risk of Infection'** pamphlet. Intinction (the action of dipping the bread in the wine at a Eucharist so that a communicant receives both together), is highly discouraged by the Diocese, so in response to this policy, we, at St. James' Ingersoll, will be discontinuing the practice of intinction and providing an alternative to those who do not wish to drink from the common cup.

A Communion plate, which holds individual cups of wine, has been donated to the Parish. Once we have received the plate we will begin to use it in place of the Intinction cup.

Hygiene and the Common Cup

Fear of communicable diseases may cause some people to take special measures or even keep them from receiving from the cup altogether. Whether these fears are actually merited depends on a number of factors...

Anglican priests, who have been performing the ablutions for centuries. In fact, the opposite is true. Nor do priests appear to have been regularly stricken with any communicable disease that could be traced to the common cup in all that time.

Additionally, no episode of disease attributable to the common cup

has ever been reported. Thus for the average communicant it would seem that

the risk of drinking from the common cup is probable less than the risk of airborne...

Intinction (dipping the bread in the wine) is in use in many Episcopal Church parishes and is increasingly being suggested in Canadian churches as well.

There is, however, real concern that many of the modes of intinction used in parishes do not diminish the threat of infection, and some may actually

increase it. Hands – children's and adult's – are at least as likely to be a source of infection (often more so) as are lips.

Receiving the wafer in the hands and then intincting it merely means that the wafer, now contaminated by the hand of the recipient, is then placed in the wine, thus spreading the infection to it. Dipping the wafer into the wine also means that the wafer picks up any bacteria that might be in the wine. So this offers no protection to the communicant.

Also, another consideration is when those who are gluten sensitive intinct in a common intinction cup. The gluten from gluten wafers is transferred into the cup and presents transference issues for those who are gluten sensitive.
