It has been the tradition of St. James' parish to take time to celebrate the lives of our loved ones who have departed. 


As **Remembrance Day** falls on a Sunday this year, we will be changing our service time to accommodate the town ceremonies. The service of **Holy Eucharist** will be held at St. James' at **9 am**, allowing for time for those who wish to proceed to Trinity United Church for the **10:30 am** ceremony followed by the laying of wreathes at **11 am** at the cenotaph at the Town Hall.

This year marks centenary of the end of the First World War. The Ingersoll Pipe Band will be joining with bands from the United Kingdom, North America and other countries around the world at 6am with the playing of the tune "When the Battle's O'er". All events are being synchronized with the time zone in the UK.

At **7 pm over** 1000 beacons of light symbolizing an end to the darkness of war and a return to the light of peace will be lit.

At **7:05 pm** our church will join with churches and cathedrals to ring out the bells across the nation and beyond, in celebration of peace along with town criers joining together in an international cry for peace.


Report From Provincial Synod Ottawa October 2nd - 4th



I was honoured to attend my first Provincial Synod for the Ecclesiastical Province of Ontario. I left Ottawa genuinely grateful for the privilege of being part of a gathering of brothers and sisters in Christ across the Province which was informative, collegial, and hopeful. The theme was "A hopeful church in changing times." Centered by bible studies and prayer, we gathered to share stories from each diocese, to discuss areas of interest which included: Elder Care, Continued Theological Education, and Homelessness.


This synod was one of transition of farewells and welcomes. We bade farewell to Archbishop Colin Johnson who served the Province as Metropolitan for 9 years. We welcomed Bishop Ann Germond as our new Metropolitan after only one ballet in the election. Bishop Ann is the Diocesan Bishop of Algoma and as part of becoming the Metropolitan will now also be the Bishop of Moosonee.

While at the gathering we also talked about issues facing the church including the ongoing conversation regarding the motion to General Synod 2019 on the marriage canon. A candy maker in Indiana wanted to make a candy that would be a witness, so he made the Christmas Candy Cane. He incorporated several symbols for the birth, ministry, and death of Jesus Christ.

He began with a stick of pure white hard candy. White to symbolize the Virgin Birth and the sinless nature of Jesus, and hard to symbolize the Solid Rock, the foundation of the Church, and firmness of the promises of God.

The candy maker made the candy in the form of a "J" to represent the precious name of Jesus, who came to earth as our Savior. It could also represent the staff of the "Good Shepherd" with which He reaches down into the ditches of the world to lift out the fallen lambs who, like all sheep, have gone astray.

Thinking that the candy was somewhat plain, the candy maker stained it with red stripes. He used three small stripes to show the stripes of the scourging Jesus received by which we are healed. as a candy cane—a meaningless decoration seen at Christmas time. But the meaning is still there for those who "have eyes to see and ears to hear."

I pray that this symbol will again be used to witness to the wonder of Jesus and his great love that came down at Christmas and remains the ultimate and dominate force in the universe today.


The Way To a Happy New Year



Stained Glass Window Feature

The stained glass window featured in this edition of "The Loop" is located on the west end of the sanctuary directly over the altar.

This window was installed in 1936 by the Robert McCausland Studios of Toronto and is a superb example of the artistry and craftsmanship of that period. This window consists of four lancets, six quatrefoils and eight random sized pieces. The two lancets on the left illustrate *The Nativity* and the two lancets on the right illustrate *At the Tomb after the Resurrection of Christ.*



This is the second example of work created by Robert McCausland Studios for our church. The other was the "Dorcas" window described in the last issue of this newsletter. Both were commissioned by the Norsworthy Family as memorials to the family matriarch and patriarch.

James Counter Norsworthy



1846 - 1936 The following information appeared in The Ingersoll Tribune on Nov. 4, 1936

ESTEEMED RESIDENT PASSES AWAY

James C. Norsworthy died suddenly at his home here Wednesday, November 4th.

Death on Wednesday morning, November 4th, removed an outstanding Ingersoll resident in the person of James Counter Norsworthy, King Street East. Deceased had been up and had breakfast as usual in the morning, and death followed suddenly about 9:45 o'clock.

Although in poor health for the past 13 years, Mr. Norsworthy had not been confined to his bed steadily. Despite his great age and his illness, he had maintained his faculties to the end.

Deceased who was in his 91st year, was born in Devonshire, England, but left for Canada on his sixth birthday, coming with his people to the Thamesford area where his father took up land. As a young man he entered the insurance business, coming to Ingersoll to make his home about 60 years ago. For many years he was an inspector for the North British Mercantile Insurance Co., remaining with that firm until superannuated. He had travelled considerably, and was a lover of sculpture and art.

The pride of his later years had been the most brilliant record of his four sons during the Great War. They made a valiant name for themselves, two having made the supreme sacrifice. Their names are written high in the list of Canadian soldiers in the world struggle, the Victoria Cross being among the cherished reminders which came of their service.

A home-loving man, Mr. Norsworthy had given much time and money to the improvement of his beautiful home and grounds on King Street East, one of most attractive of Ingersoll properties. For these reasons, he had not been one to seek public office, although many years ago he served for a time on the Ingersoll Board of Education. He had always taken a deep interest, however, in the affairs of his community and of the

world at large.

A plainly-spoken man, and one who at all times indicated the full courage of his convictions, deceased was never doubted as to his stand or viewpoint on any public question. A great reader, and a student of world affairs, especially as they centred about the events leading up to, during and following the Great War, deceased was regarded a particularly well-versed on these matters, and, in a private way, an authority on many angles of that catastrophe. He was a member of St. James' Anglican Church.

Mr. Norsworthy was married twice, his first wife being Mary Jane Cuthbert, who passed away some 41 years ago he married Mrs. John T. MacDonald of Sarnia, who survives him. He is also survived by the following sons and daughter by his first marriage: Lt.-Col. S. C. and Lieut. J. W. Norsworthy, Montreal; and Miss Helen A. Norsworthy. Two sons, Major Edward C. and Adjutant Alfred J. gave their lives overseas.

The funeral was held from the family residence "Norleigh", King Street East, on Saturday afternoon, where a short private service was conducted at 2 o'clock to St. James Anglican Church for public service at 2:30 o'clock. The service at the church was very largely attended and was in charge of Capt., the Rev. C. K. Masters, rector of St. James' Church. Members of the choir were in attendance. Although it was asked that flowers be omitted, there were many very beautiful floral pieces in evidence, testifying to the high esteem in which deceased was held.

The pall bearers were: Messr. Rex Yule, James S. Cuthbert, Senator Donald Sutherland; W. W. Thompson, Montreal; G. C. Dewar and G. F. Pearson, Toronto. Interment was made in the Ingersoll Rural Cemetery. Relatives were present from St. Thomas, London, Sarnia, Trenton, Forest, Toronto, Galt, Hamilton and WIndsor. Others from a distance included Lieut-Col. W. H. Clark-Kennedy, V. C., Montreal; Mr. and Mrs. Hopkins, Toronto; William C. Noxon, Toronto; T. R. Richardson; Galt; W. T. A. MacFayden, Toronto; George I. Evans, Hamilton; W. James and J. H. Matson, London; J. R. Beaton, Waterloo; Harold P. Ferrier, Watford; W. H. Dawson, Tillsonburg; M. H. Johnston, Woodstock;, and L. P. Thompson, Cobourg


Symbols in The Centre Four Quatrefoils The Crown

The IHS


The Christogram IHS is a monogram symbolizing Jesus Christ. From Greek it is an abbreviation of the name IH Σ OY Σ (Jesus).



The Chi Rho

The Chi-Rho (pronounced "KEE-roe") is a Christian symbol consisting of the intersection of the capital Greek letters Chi (X) and Rho (P), which are the first two letters of "Christ" in Greek (XPI Σ TO Σ , Christos). The Chi-Rho can represent either Christ or Christianity and is also known as a Christogram.

Monuments and Plaques to The Norsworthy Men



The life-size bronze bust of Major Edward C. Norsworthy was created by British Canadian sculptor Hamilton Plantagenet MacCarthy. It was unveiled to the public in April 1918, three years after Edward had been killed in action.

On April 21, 1918, the Norsworthy Monument was officially unveiled by the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario, on behalf of masons in Montreal. The Norsworthy Monument was originally unveiled to commemorate the heroism of Major Edward C. Norsworthy, but all four of J.C. Norsworthy's sons Edward, Alfred, Stanley and John) served in the First World War.

All four were born in Ingersoll, received their university education at McGill, and all went into the banking business. Edward was the eldest and one of the first to enlist in September 1914 at Valcartier, Quebec.

He was shipped out with the 1st Division of the Canadian Expeditionary Force. He was Second in Command of the Royal Highland Regiment, Black Watch of Canada when the Germans unleashed poisonous gas for the first time, during the Second Battle of Ypres. Edward was reported to have succumbed to wounds in the field during the night of April 22, 1915. His younger brother Alfred was killed in action in the days leading up to Vimy Ridge, while brother Stanley was in command of the Black Watch during the attack on Vimy. The youngest brother John had served with Alfred and he too was also wounded during that famous attack. John is buried beneath the Norsworthy Monument along with his father, mother and wife.

One of Alfred's grave markers is located directly behind the monument. His original wooden cross in Barlin Cemetery was replaced with a stone marker, and then replaced again by the standard military marker. That stone marker was sent to his father in Ingersoll.


The monument also has a bronze plaque memorializing two of J.C. Norsworthy's nephews; Robert and Harold Hunter. They were sons of his sister living in Brampton Ontario. Robert was killed on September 17, 1918 and Harold was killed just six days before the Armistice.

James C. Norswothy and his two wives also have plaques placed on this monument located in the Ingersoll Rural cemetery upon their deaths. (If you click on the photo below, you will be able to access his Family Tree).





