For those of us not attending Synod, we can still take part in the church service virtually. The service will be in-person and livestreamed from the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul.

Synod then moves to RBC Place in London with a dinner on Sunday evening.
Synod reconvenes on Monday at RBC Place.
For those delegates from each parish that cannot attend in person, there is an option to attend the meeting with a Zoom Webinar.

A Little Something From Sue's Perspective

Henri Nouwen

Henri Nouwen is one of my favourite modern-day theologians. He was compassionate, wise, and smart. I could tell you about his background, but I am going to suggest that you learn about him with a little research. One thing that is significant about Nouwen was his choice to leave academia and live and work with the people of L'Arche Daybreak in Richmond Hill in 1986. Henri Nouwen died in September 1996.

L'Arche communities are all over the world. The first one was established in France by Canadian, Jean Vanier, the son of former Governor General, Georges Vanier and his wife Pauline Vanier. L'Arche is a community-centered organization where people with intellectual disabilities live, work and grow together with people who assist them with their daily living. It is a faith-based organization centered in Christianity, but people of any worldview are welcome. It was in this environment where Henri Nouwen found peace, authenticity and a place where he felt truly at home...

I have been an Anglican since before I was born. For as long as I can remember, I have been a "church geek" and Church has been an integral part of my life. I don't remember much about the first church I attended but I do remember the second church. I remember the people who went there and I remember the clergy who came and went. Most of all, I remember the singing and I remember the man who was the Sunday School superintendent. Both of those left an immense imprint on my life. Mrs. Allen, who led the choir practices, encouraged me to be the best singer that I could be. Mr. Whitby, a kind and gentle man, had a way about him that made Sunday School lessons come to life. Both of these people played an important part in my life and I expect neither of them ever knew it. Along with Mrs. Allen and Mr. Whitby, there were many others who attended that church who taught me, unbeknownst to them, so much about what it means to be a loving, generous, supportive human being. Think about the people whom you have known over the years who have made a difference in your life ...



The people God puts in your path don't necessarily have to be people that you meet in person. Consider those whose words you read. Consider those of whom you hear stories. Consider those whose life-choices make you sit back and go "hmmm." How we respond to the people who pop up in our paths, I believe, helps us to figure out what God has in store for us. One person who comes to mind for me is Barbara Brown Taylor. I do not know her personally. I have attended a conference at which she was the keynote speaker, followed by a worship service at which she preached an amazing sermon. One of the things, among several, that I have learned from her is how to laugh at myself in the midst of my faith. Sometimes, when it comes to faith and church, I take myself far too seriously. Brown Taylor has taught me to evaluate myself and my responses to those things that irk me and to say, "How important is that in the scheme of things? Will that matter in a week?" However, she has also taught me the importance of authenticity in my preaching. Trust me, I do not preach nearly as well as Barbara Brown Taylor and I never will. What is important in this is that I was able to...

When it comes to the people who influence you, it can be the person you least expect. We all assume that the people who help us discern are people whom we have grown up with, the people that we respected as a child, the people who are our peers. Let's look at others who may have had an influence on you...if you are/were a teacher, what about those students that fill/filled your days? Those of us who are parents, what about our children and perhaps, even their friends? What about the homeless person whom you have encountered regularly? What about the dying person who is frightened? What about the living person who is frightened? Every last person we encounter impacts our lives in some way or another. What Nouwen is saying here is for us to pay attention. We let lots of moments pass us by without a second thought. We let lots of people pass us by without a second thought. What we really need to do is...

Vision Committee Report



As reported to Vestry on January 29, 2023, we have been working with Trinity Centres Foundation (TCF) regarding a lead they provided for a new construction project. Our collaboration with TCF resulted in them issuing a letter of interest on our behalf in early December last year.

A reply to that letter was received on March 22. 2023 wherein the party agrees there is a mutual interest in the construction project. however, they revealed the project has been delayed, and they have not yet reached the site plan application stage. This translates to a considerable delay.

Recently, we were provided another lead by TCF for a parcel of land for sale on Newton Street. While the site is attractive, it is on the edge of the town and requires a septic tank, weeping bed and a water well. Your committee agreed those requirements and other considerations rendered this property impractical for our purposes.

We continue to work both independently and with TCF for other opportunities to resettle St. James'.

Selection Committee Report


On March 8th at the Parish Council meeting, the council was asked by Archdeacon Osita Oluigbo, our regional diocesan archdeacon, to form a Parish Selection Committee for a permanent priest.

The committee members are: Rosemarie Brokenshire, Mary Fitzmorris, Veronica Jackson, Shelley Riddick, Kristy Van

Kooten-Bossence, Michael Watson, and Bob Welt; with God at our centre to help and guide

On Wednesday May 3rd we met with Archdeacon Osita, At this meeting, Rosemarie Brokenshire was voted Chairperson. Archdeacon Osita outlined the procedures of calling a priest and the committee's roles, responsibilities, and the importance of compliance with legislative, Human Rights and Human Resource policies. The diocesan policy regarding confidentiality was read and we all signed the Statement of Confidentiality. It is absolutely essential that we maintain confidentiality. We will keep you informed about the process. However, once we receive names of potential candidates, we cannot give you information. Please do not ask us.

Our first step is the preparation of a Congregational Survey which has already begun and will be presented to you relatively soon. This survey will be your opportunity to provide valued input to the narratives of who we are now and what the goals and objectives are for the future of St. James'. Please keep your minds, hearts, and spirits open as you thoughtfully and prayerfully complete the survey.



Parish Profile



The second step is the creation of a Parish Profile which needs to be an honest and accurate document without candy coating. The profile will be a narrative which summarizes the results of the Congregational Survey, information about our community of Ingersoll and anything else that properly conveys the story of where we've been, what we are doing today and our goals for the future. This document will assist both the Bishop, as he considers individuals for this opportunity, as well as the candidates themselves. We ask you to pray for the Parish Selection Committee. both as individuals and as a group. Also, pray for the person who will answer our call and pray that God is already working in that person's life.

Our Dinner and Show Fundraiser April 28, 2023







IN A NUTSHELL - WHAT DO YOUR WARDENS DO?

- 1. Wardens, together with the Incumbent and Vestry members, are responsible for all aspects of parish life. They must work with and support the Incumbent, be loyal to him/her, and respect his/her confidence.
- 2. Wardens must be available to the members of the congregation for information, complaints, or suggestions.
- 3. Wardens are responsible for the holding of regular services, and for the provision of all things requisite for Divine Service. If there is neglect or inability on the part of the Incumbent to perform his/her responsibilities, the Church Wardens must notify the Bishop as to the situation.
- 4. 

On Saturday April 29th a few of us attended the ACW Annual event at the Cathedral in London. Thank goodness for GPS and we made it through the construction in downtown to enjoy the day of camaraderie titles "Walk Humbly with God". At that time, we presented the results of a committee of about 8 women meeting each month since last September 2022 discussing the Future of ACW in the Diocese of Huron. Diocesan ACW Future Committee

Summary Report

At the April 2022 Annual Meeting, a motion was made for the formation of a committee to determine what the structure of the A.C.W. (Anglican Church Women) should be as the church moves forward into the future. The motion was: Many churches no longer have a formal ACW group but the work gets done. ACW needs to reflect the modern reality. A committee should be formed to form a proposal for 2023.

A committee of ten members was formed that included representatives who volunteered to serve from active parish ACWs and members of the Diocese of Huron ACW Diocesan Council who were selected by the ACW Diocesan President. The demographics of the members include small and large churches, rural and urban. The members are seniors.

As the work got underway, it was evident that a proposal for 2023 would not be possible because of many factors. After discussion, the Diocesan ACW Council voted:

THAT the original motion to form a proposal for 2023 be set aside to allow the Committee to further discuss the many problems found and to look into possible solutions.

Issues identified

In Committee discussions and with input from deanery members, a number of issues were identified summarized following.

- Aging population of ACW participants. Some have died, have mobility issues, don't drive and are not fully electronically capable.
- Fear of disease keeps some from in person worship.
- Pandemic measures sped up global changes.
- The ACW has lost its overall direction and sense of community. Many do not identify as an Anglican Church Women member.
- Many don't want to come out to a "meeting" even after receiving many invitations.
- Some are already a Warden, on Parish Council, part of Altar/Chancel Guild, sing in choir ...
- Some have lost their church building
- Food Events have changed and Craft/Bazaar Events have changed

ACW Ministries

We looked at the ministries in the parish/deaneries that have been successful and could still be viable. Events still rely on willing participants but help build community revealing God's love for one another through work and stewardship.

- Food Events such as parish suppers, pancake breakfast, baking pies and making soup ...
- Fun Events such as fashion shows, card parties, craft projects, Coffee Clatch ...
- Faith events such as prayer bowl, speakers, talk about our faith, telephone tree, movie night ...
- Educational events such as how to prevent being scammed and what do the various leaders/groups/committees actually do?
- Full time activities such as Nearly New Shop

The committee also looked at ACW outreach ministry listing current ministries in some of our deaneries. It was suggested that ideas be added to Huron Church News ACW page each month sharing our outreach activities. Great ideas come when we listen to what others are doing.

Conclusions

While there remain questions about the future of ACW, it became evident that **one size does not fit all**. It was noted years ago women's ministry had limited roles. Now in many parishes, women are heavily involved in everything around the church including Wardens and members of Parish Council so that the formal organization of the ACW often seems unnecessary. Much of the work is done by Parish Council committees with participation by both women and men.

Communication is key. If ACWs are to continue we need to tell who we are and what we do. The Diocesan ACW has been without a representative for Communication for some time. ACW ministries need to be highlighted at the Diocesan, deanery and parish level to spread the news. There is a need for intercommunication. Deanery representatives serve an important role in communication.

An article in the March edition of HCN asked for more feedback from the Diocesan community. Currently we have not received any feedback. Is it indicative of lack of interest or not understanding the goal or do we need to communicate in a different mode?

Questions we could not answer include:

- Should we or could we change our name? What might it be?
- Should the structure of the ACW Diocesan Council /deanery ACW or parish ACW change or do we completely disband them? Are our structures appropriate to our changing world?
- Should we make the rules flexible for each church/parish/community encouraging each ACW to operate as they wish but continue to communicate successes?
- What is the word from our National ACW? Is the National ACW looking into structure changes?
 No communication from the National ACW so is it needed?

Where do we go from here?

- If the Futures Committee is to continue, will the current members continue and if it continues, we recommend additional members to replace those who resigned.
- Have a follow up article regarding the report presented at The ACW Annual asking for more input so that we can collect information from the larger community.
- Send the report to the National ACW for comment and ask for the status of their review.

ACW More Than A Name

When the ACW was established in the 1960s, the first President wrote that ACW was more than a name. While the structure was developed to connect women together throughout Canada, most remain focused on their own parish. Many women remain committed to ministry and service sharing our common faith in Christ, even if they do not have an ACW.



St. James' Needle & Craft Group Report



The Needlecraft Group started up again in October 2022. It was wonderful to be back together after two and a half years of shutdowns. We were ready to work and make some changes.

First, we changed our name to Needle & Craft Group to invite a variety of people with different crafts and skills. We now have, in addition to those who quilt, knit and crochet, an artist, and paper crafters.

Next, we defined our purpose as Serving Our Community. The group chose to fundraise to help the Salvation Army Food Bank, Interchurch, and Cycles of Life.

Then, we created a prayer that represents who we are as individuals and as a group. God is our guide and the source of our creativity.

We meet every Tuesday from 1:30 pm to 4:30ish pm at the Annex.

There is prayer, laughter, fellowship and fun. And, of course there is always tea and a cookie. Join us weekly or when you are able.

Two busy months. Our quilters finished one baby quilt and set up another. Mittens were knit for Cycles of Life. Microwave Potato Bags were sewn and sold.
